Q: What is the biggest difference between elementary and middle school student teaching?

C: Middle school and kindergarten is a bit different. Differentiation is a strongly needed in kindergarten.

A: Meeting people in different in your (math) department and planning off of others is nice because you can focus on your subject.

Q: How are the attitudes different between middle school and elementary students?

C: It might sound hard but you'll know. You'll be able to figure it out and build those connections. Be real with those kids, give them information about you to learn about them. Know where the line is so you don't cross it, you're a teacher but you're a teacher who cares and let them know that.

A: Going to their events is really great. Building that parent relationship is huge. Having that connection to help the student in the end. Also contacting the principal. Letting them know what happened to keep them in the know.

C: Asking your parent for help. Getting them on the same page to help the student will help the student and help build that relationship.

Q: What is your favorite part of working with middle school students?

A: The passion and the the excitement they have. I do love block scheduling to have longer times to work on projects with them.

C: They enjoy learning things from you and it's amazing to see them teach each other and take charge of their learning. Having a dry sense of humor relates to them, starting with a joke to lighten the mood and get them going.

A: They're quirky, and it's fun to go with their quirkiness. Going to their middle school dances, I was never brave enough to do it.

Q: What is the biggest challenge you have working with middle school students?

A: You are able to deal with their challenges for the 8 weeks.

C: The difference between having kindergarten kids and middle schoolers is getting them to open up. Middle schoolers don't always know their place yet and are trying to figure out who to trust, working at it and building that trust getting them to open up to you.

A: Having families who don't value education. Getting them to understand the importance of their education when their parents don't. By the time your in 7th or 8th grade and if they don't have the foundation to build off of makes it hard, especially in math, but happens in every subject.

C: The biggest thing I learned in college and in student teaching is you don't know everyone's home life. Getting the kids to come to school is the biggest thing then building that trust to understand them takes work but worth it.

A: Kids with divorced parents have that instability going from house to house, understanding that they have a hectic life and you can only do the best you can. Knowing social workers to help them out and counselors to help is all you can do sometimes.

C: Getting to know the kid's home life is hard, going home and crying happens. Being able to see that kid work is amazing.

A: Working with those kids to help them and seeing them work is wonderful.

Q: How do you build authority when working with middle school students?

A: You make a goal of what you see in the camera, I am a straightforward person but I didn't have a loud clear voice. Using a bell so they make that connection they need to quiet down works too. That loud voice in needed.

C: One of the things I tried to make sure I did better is standing outside the door and giving high fives, fist bumps, whatever to show them you're not always behind the desk and you care. Setting those expectations, I respect you and you respect me. Having them understand those expectations so they know where they stand.

A: Building authority between individual students. They have to keep a certain grade due to a no fail policy. Having them know that if they don't meet these goals they will be go right back to learning it after the test, reassessing.

Q: What steps are you taking right now to look for a job?

C: Teachlowa.gov is what I use. Looking there you can choose your location and browse job opportunities. You can fill out forms then you're on their. You see a job you want and hit apply and they see all your job. Subbing because everyone needs subs.

A: I did a district wide application so that I can do any of those schools.

C: For subbing you go to the main office and you bring them back but if you're looking for actual jobs that's when you use Teach Iowa.

A: I have done a few mock interviews to get myself ready. There's so many opportunities.

C: Subbing is definitely a need. But there are many high need areas even around the Cedar Falls area for teachers. Many places are looking to hire full-time right now. You get to pick your location.

A: Building those connections. Please don't put your PRAXIS 2 off before your graduation.

C: Honestly, go print off that free study guide and do it, it will help you! You gotta study for it and don't put it off.

A: Do it before you student teach you honestly don't have time.

Q: How tired are you?

A: Honestly I went to be at 7 to wake up past my alarm the next day at 7. You will build that stamina but you're tired. You will be exhausted. You really value your weekends. Leave time for yourself, you can't do too much.

C: Know your limits.

Q: When you first got your placement did you get all of your placements at once or was it staggered?

A: Be flexible to no end.
